Dear Mayor Bigstyck and Councilmembers,

I'm writing to you with regard to Item #9 for the March 27, 2023 City Council Agenda:

As stated in the staff report:

"The primary role of City commission and committees is generally to provide advice, recommendations and assistance to the City Council and to promote increased public input and citizen participation in the determination of City policies and program implementation. It would be impractical and too burdensome for the City Council to review and consider all specific issues related to all program areas of the City, so the Council often relies on commission or committees to guide its decision making."

Commissions and Committees do just this, provide additional time and opportunity for public input and consideration by community members appointed to Commissions and Committees to distill discussion and provide input to City Council. The City of Pacifica, comparatively, has a limited number of Commissions and Committees to assist in this important work to SUPPORT City Council and staff in key decisions facing the City. Other cities have taken on important issues through Commissions and Committees, such as sustainability, age-friendly programs, and arts and culture to name a few that are fairly common in San Mateo County and other cities.

Over the years, members of these important bodies, when they feel they need additional guidance and input, have reached out to City Council to review their Charters. This has been done by the Beautification Advisory Committee, Economic Development Committee and most recently, a review has been requested by the Open Space and Parkland Advisory Committee. (The Library Advisory Committee hasn't met since prior to the pandemic.)

Over the past many months, staff leadership has noted that current City of Pacifica staffing levels make it difficult to move ahead on important projects and are concerned about their workload. Therefore, I strongly recommend that City Council take the approach outlined in Alternative Action #2:

Undertake only one or two priority reviews at this time.

The Open Space and Parkland Advisory Committee has been requesting a review. Please move forward with doing so. Now is not the time, based on staff's own concern, to add additional reviews to staff's reported already full plates.

And, please also consider short-term initiatives by Commissions and Committee members, when brought forward to you, that can alleviate the work of staff by taking on projects. Engage with and accept support from members of the community who want to work with city staff on the important issue of updating the Short Term

Rental Ordinance. Who will be working on the critical Climate Action Plan, that hasn't been addressed in a number of years? Who will be communicating with the public and tree services about the new Heritage Tree Ordinance and to review the feasibility of creating an adopt-a-tree program, similar to the already existing Beautification Advisory Committee. The work on trees could be jointly reviewed by the PBR Commission and Beautification Advisory Committee in collaboration with community groups such as Tree City Pacifica.

The City of Pacifica, since it's inception has been underfunded. *Commissions and Committees (and collaboration with local volunteer community groups), when used effectively, can extend the capability of our limited staff. There needs to be an openness to this though.* While recognizing that Commissions and Committees do take staff time, the statement that:

"C/Cs are staff-intensive: While intended to provide advice, recommendations, and assistance to the City Council, administering each C/C in accordance with the Brown Act, researching and preparing agenda reports, and conducting periodic recruitments requires dedicated staff resources."

is disappointing at best. Community members are volunteering their valued time in service to the City of Pacifica. Please be open to the value that is provided and re-image the roles not as being "staff-intensive" but "staff-enhancing".

Thank you for your consideration and hopefully willingness to think outside the box to take advantage of a key resource that has been critical to the city's functioning for decades – volunteers.

Dear Council Members:

The purpose of this communication is to bring to your attention OSPAC's request to revise its authorizing resolution.

As you know, Pacifica identifies itself by its Open Space and over the years has had many different types of Open Space Committees. Over time, the role the Committee has played has changed.

Attached are copies of the existing resolution as well as the proposed (Draft) amended OSPAC resolution.

OSPAC'S subcommittee for Amending OSPAC'S Authorizing Resolution worked hard to incorporate input from the greater committee and the public to update our role to better reflect community needs and expectations. OSPAC approved the draft resolution on 10/20/21. The objective of the proposed draft authorizing resolution for OSPAC is to achieve the following:

- 1. Build on the existing resolution from 2015.
- 2. Respond to the public's request for OSPAC to be more involved in the development process, especially with the Hillside Preservation District (HPD) but also for development proposals on lands adjacent to parklands and other open spaces. We want to make it clear that we are not trying to usurp the existing Planning Dept or Planning Commission process, but instead we are trying to provide a public platform early in the process for an applicant to describe their project and how it relates to the open spaces it's on or adjacent to. We are hopeful OSPAC's role will be to provide a tool that helps both Council and staff, and which helps to alleviate the misinformation that can happen when communities turn to social media for information instead of participating in formal public discourse.
- 3. Begin pursuing funding to support open space through bonds, grants, or other sources.
- Become more engaged with other commissions and committees and groups and how we all interact with each other.

We are fully aware that cities must comply with California law. With the passage of recent legislation at the State level, future local input on development may be more limited than it was historically. That said, we believe there is still a role to play a the local level, and

OSPAC could help improve coordination between the developers and the public on topics related to open space and parklands in Pacifica.

We hope Council agrees that it is time to update OSPAC's authorizing resolution from 2015. We look forward to discussing these items further through a public study session. If Council agrees to the new role outlined for OSPAC in the attached draft authorizing resolution, there may be a need for Council to also amend the Pacifica Municipal Code. In particular, OSPAC may need to be formally given the authority to provide comment on proposed developments. Planning Staff or Legal Counsel can explain what would be needed. Our hope is that OSPAC's proposed new role will improve Pacifica's public process and benefit both community and property owners.

RESOLUTION NO. 44-2015 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PACIFICA CREATING AN OPEN SPACE AND PARKLAND ADVISORY COMMITTEE AND RESCINDING RESOLUTION NO. 31-2013

WHEREAS, a subcommittee of the Council reviewed the function of City Commissions and Committees and held a Study Session on March 20, 2013; and

WHEREAS, natural areas and parks surround the City of Pacifica, contribute to its beauty and character, and remain a valued asset for our community; and

WHEREAS, there was an Open Space Advisory Committee without an authorizing resolution and a Golden Gate National Recreation Area Advisory Committee with an expired authorizing resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Council determined that it would be beneficial to combine the functions of the two committees into one committee called the Open Space and Parkland Advisory Committee that would consider issues related to natural areas that are proposed to be dedicated to the Golden Gate National Recreation Area ("GGNRA"), lands that are proposed to be dedicated open space, parklands that are under the jurisdiction of the GGNRA and areas operated by San Mateo County Parks Department; and

WHEREAS, the committee shall also advise the City Council on other pertinent open space issues, the current priority objectives of the committee shall be to make recommendations to the City Council on: (1)The Policy and Procedures of the National Park Service ("NPS") as they relate to areas of the GGNRA within the City of Pacifica and adjacent communities; (2) Issues surrounding the transfer of ownership of Cattle Hill and the Pedro Point Headlands to the NPS; (3) Access and operation of the San Mateo County Parks in the City of Pacifica including the San Pedro Valley County Park and the Devil's Slide Trail County Park; and (4) Ways in which these areas can contribute to the economy of the City; and

WHEREAS, the committee may also advise applicants on properties listed in the Open Space Task Force report and on other open space issues. Recommendations of the committee will be solely advisory; and

WHEREAS, while some of the recommended actions of the Open Space Task Force Report have been completed, the report should remain the basic reference for the Open Space and Parkland Advisory Committee; and

WHEREAS, The Open Space and Parkland Advisory Committee will be comprised of nine (9) members selected by the Council from the community at large; and

WHEREAS, on June 10, 2013, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 31-2013, a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Pacifica Creating an Open Space and Parkland Advisory Committee (the "OSPAC Resolution"); and

WHEREAS, on November 23, 2015 the City Council considered amending the OSPAC Resolution.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Resolution No. 31-2013 is hereby rescinded; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Pacifica does hereby authorize the creation of the Open Space and Parkland Advisory Committee to consist of 9 members appointed by the City Council with the goals and objectives as stated in this resolution.

BE IT RESOLVED that planning project applicants shall be required to participate in a public study session during OSPAC's monthly meetings for properties listed in the Open Space Task Force report, as well as vacant parcels in the Hillside Preservation District (HPD), vacant adjacent to existing parklands, or existing and proposed trails. The purpose of the study session is for the applicant to share their design and vision, to establish an opportunity for the public to have a voice, and for OSPAC to work with the applicant collaboratively in the early conceptual stage, as soon as practicable after the initial application package is submitted, to bring stakeholders together to identify opportunities to bring value to the project and for open space preservation, natural resource protection, and public benefit. Recommendations from OSPAC would be incorporated into the Planning Department's staff report on the project proposal; and

BE IT RESOLVED, that Committee members may assist staff with identifying sources of funding for open space preservation, acquisition, enhancement, and maintenance. Funding sources could be as varied as grants, bond or parcel tax measures or community fund raising resources; and

Subject: Public Comment on Rooftop Solar Permitting

City Council and Staff:

My name is Nancy Tierney and I live in the lower Manor District of Pacifica. I want to speak briefly about a grant opportunity for solar power that our city should pursue. I care deeply about climate change and spend a lot of my time learning about the environmental effects locally and beyond, and taking action when I can. One area where we can improve is expanding the use of solar energy, in particular rooftop solar. A recent decision by the CPUC adopting "NEM 3.0" allows utilities like PG&E to tax rooftop solar shared with the grid, weakening the financial incentive to invest in rooftop solar. To offset a decline in solar energy growth, we need to look at ways to reduce other costs such as permitting. Streamlining solar permitting can cut red tape and make it cheaper and easier to install solar panels and batteries.

A new state law (SB379) now requires every city to implement an automated solar permitting system. For small cities (under 50,000) like Pacifica the deadline is September 2024. The state Energy Commission in the Natural Resources Agency is offering grants of about \$40,000 per city to help with the implementation. The application form is simple, and all applications so far have been approved. Pacifica and many cities have not applied yet. The grant application deadline is May 1, and the money is first-come-first served. I urge you to apply for the grant to streamline permitting and quickly comply with the Solar Access Act. The Solar Rights Alliance (solarrights.org) is a great resource on the topic.

Thanks for your time and consideration as we work together to expand renewable energy in Pacifica.
