OBJECTION TO RUSHED, SHORT-NOTICED SPECIAL MEETING OF COUNCIL, CALLED ON IRREGULAR AND EXTRAORDINARILY SHORT 4-DAY PUBLIC NOTICE, AND WITHOUT PUBLISHED AGENDA OR AGENDA PACKET, APPARENTLY TO CONSIDER FINAL ADOPTION OF A HIGHLY CONTROVERSIAL PACIFICA LOCAL COASTAL LAND USE PLAN THAT, AS OF COUNSEL'S MAY 23 MEETING ON THE MATTER HAD SEVERAL SIGNIFICANT UNRESOLVED ISSUES OF LAW, KEY FACTS MISSTATED IN STAFF'S RESPONSES TO COUNSEL'S WRITTEN QUESTIONS, AND UNANSWERED COUNSEL QUESTIONS. THIS PELL-MELL PROCEDURE WOULD VIOLATE BOTH THE LETTER AND THE SPIRIT OF COASTAL ACT SECTION 30006 (WHICH DECLARES THE PUBLIC'S "RIGHT TO FULLY PARTICIPATE IN DECISIONS AFFECTING COASTAL PLANNING" AND THE NEED FOR "THE WIDEST OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC PARTICIPATION". AND MOREOVER WOULD CONTRADICT THE CALIFORNIA COASTAL COMMISSION'S OWN MISSION STATEMENT COMMITMENT TO "STRONG PUBLIC PARTICIPATION".

Dear Mayor Vaterlaus and Councilmembers,

We noticed for the first time this morning (Friday, May 31) that a Special meeting has been noticed on Council's Agenda internet website: <a href="https://pacificacityca.iqm2.com/Citizens/Default.aspx">https://pacificacityca.iqm2.com/Citizens/Default.aspx</a>. The notice was not up on the Agenda website on May 29 or 30. This is apparently the follow-up meeting – discussed hypothetically with the City Manager and Planning Director near midnight at the close of Council's 6-plus hour May 23 meeting — for Council to again consider adoption of a Resolution to approve Pacifica's April 2024 Draft Local Coastal Land Use Plan. There was no explanation from Staff or discussion by Council as to an "emergency" justification for hyper-rushed process. At that time, the City Manager said that if a June 4 meeting were to go forward, the City would publicly notice it on May 24, and the Planning Director noted that the City would be unable to publish its Staff Report for the hypothetical June 4 meeting with its customary 1-week advance public notice.

Neither the City Manager, Planning Director, nor City Attorney mentioned, and there was no discussion at that time (at the May 23 Council meeting) by Council of the Coastal Act's mandates for the public's "right to fully participate" and for "the widest opportunity for public participation" in coastal planning matters. Nor was there discussion of the Coastal Commission's own Mission Statement's commitment to "strong public participation" in "careful planning" and other Commission affairs.

So we provide these mandates here now for Council's unhurried and serious consideration before a final decision is made whether or not to proceed on June 4 in such an irregular manner.

Coastal Act, California Public Resources Code Section 30006<sup>2</sup>

The Legislature further finds and declares that the public has a right to fully participate in decisions affecting coastal planning, conservation, and development; that achievement of sound coastal conservation and development is dependent upon public understanding and support; and that the continuing planning and implementation of programs for coastal conservation and development should include the widest opportunity for public participation. (emphasis added)

California Coastal Commission, Mission Statement<sup>3</sup>

The Commission is committed to protecting and enhancing California's coast and ocean for present and future generations. It does so through careful planning and regulation of environmentally-sustainable development, rigorous use of science, **strong public participation**, education, and effective intergovernmental coordination. (emphasis added)

At several points in Council's May 23 meeting, Councilmembers expressed that (1) the Pacifica public and/or (2) Councilmembers themselves did not understand the factual and legal

complexities and risks presented in the April 2024 Draft LCLUP, including uncertainties about the Special Resiliency Area policies, the extent of flood and Tsunami coastal hazard zones, the accuracy of maps, and the legal issues of property rights and "takings" under the U.S. and State of California Constitutions. These issues and more remained undecided and unvoted-upon by Council as of the close of Council's May 23 meeting.

Should Council proceed with a short-noticed Special Meeting on June 4, we will have more to say in a follow-up letter or letters. But for now, we remind Council of the Legislature's wisdom expressed in the Coastal Act Section 30006 (above), that the public has a right to "fully participate in decisions affecting coastal planning," and that "sound coastal conservation and development is dependent upon public understanding and support." A June 4 meeting would short-shrift the public's right to know and participate.

We submit that the proposed June 4 Special Meeting, on extraordinarily shortened notice and without even a published agenda as of the time of this writing, does not meet the standard of the Coastal Act Section 30006. And we respectfully request that the Special Meeting calendared for June 4 be regularly scheduled, with Agenda posted simultaneously, for a later date.

Dear planning department and city council, here are my comments:

- 1. The deletion of parking on Palmetto near Esplanade intersection is problematic as this is overflow parking for the beach access point adjacent to Ocean Aire nearby. Coastal Commission may also object as this loss of parking restricts beach access.
- 2. There should be a raised crosswalk on Esplanade opposite the beach access point at Ocean Aire.
- 3. All crosswalks should be be raised for traffic calming.
- 4. Bike path should be between parking spaces, where occurs, and the curb with some space between parked cars and bike path to allow passengers to open door and step out without interfering with bike traffic. This is best practices for safest bike paths.

A lot of emails have bounced because the photos were too large, so resending with a google drive <u>link</u> instead.

Quick update especially for Manor residents that the plans for bicycle and pedestrian improvements to Palmetto from Westline Drive to Paloma as well as the entire length of Esplanade are coming before the Planning Commission Monday night (7pm, 2212 Beach Boulevard). The agenda can be found <a href="here">here</a>. It is item 3 that starts on packet page 97.

I marked up some google map images (attached in a pdf) to give you a simpler idea of the scope of work from Westline to Avalon without needing to look at all the technical drawings. I have met with many residents with concerns about speed of cars, ability to cross Esplanade from east to west, and oversized vehicle parking in the area, and these questions are not all answered in the staff report. There is also a considerable amount of existing parking to be taken out to make room for the bike lanes, primarily on Palmetto near OceanAire. I have sent my questions (reflecting many of yours - traffic calming measures, potential for an additional east/west crosswalk near Monterey or Bill Drake) into city staff and asked for clarification at the meeting tomorrow.

It's really important for the city staff and planning commission to hear your questions and concerns directly as well so I encourage you to participate, in person or on <u>zoom</u>. You can also send in any questions or comments by email before noon Monday to: <u>publiccomment@pacifica.gov</u> and in the subject line say PC meeting Item 3.



Dear Mayor Vaterlaus and council members,

As expected, Ocean Protection Council (OPC) adopted new sea level guidance yesterday that predicts a much lesser amount of sea level rise by 2100. See State of California Sea Level Rise Guidance: 2024 Science & Policy Update. OPC's guidance reflects the best available science and is used by the State of California as the basis for sea level rise planning. As such, this affects all the sea level rise maps, policies, and planning used in Pacifica's current draft LCLUP.

OPC's previous 2018 guidance stated that the medium-high risk (0.5% chance of probability) of sea level rise was 5.7 ft by 2100. The new guidance predicts 3.1 ft of sea level rise for the Intermediate scenario by 2100 – a 54% decrease. OPC's policy states, "This scenario provides a reasonable upper bound for the most likely range of sea level rise" [page 6]. Further, OPC removed the H++ extreme sea level rise scenario presented in the 2018 sea level guidance, because it "is not physically plausible" [page 22]. The new guidance offers an opportunity to revise and improve our plan and policies based on the latest science and best practices.

ESA used the 2018 OPC sea level guidance to produce the vulnerability and hazard maps used throughout Pacifica's LCLUP draft. City staff and California Coastal Commission repeatedly reference these maps to form the policies and restrictions used throughout the LCLUP. City planners and home and property owners rely on these maps to determine which policies apply to them. It is important for these maps and policies to be current.

It is stated **eleven times** in the LCLUP that the planning document is based on best available science, therefore the vulnerability and hazard maps and the policies that rely on them must be updated to reflect this new guidance before resubmitting anything else to the California Coastal Commission.

We appreciate your attention and cooperation on this matter.

I do not support the plan to build a steel and concrete wall on the base of the bluff off of Esplanade or the base of any bluff for that matter. You will just end up with steel and concrete ultimately littering the beach, adding to the pollution of the ocean. This plan will not prevent the cliffs from eroding. So-called 'armoring' the coast has not been proven to be an effective solution to anything. A number of years ago there was a construction project in that same area. It took a long time and involved the laying of a large network of pipes under the sand and many huge rocks were transported down to the water and buried. There were construction vehicles taking up parking spaces and the beach was inaccessible for months. Was that effective? Does anyone even know? And now you are proposing to do that all over again. And for what?
